On Thursday of week 6, Anabelle and I were fortunate enough to pay a visit to the Parliament of New South Wales and Government House, as part of the NSW Government's School Leadership Program. The day began with a train ride to Martin Place, where we proceeded to the NSW parliament building. The group of school leaders was then led to viewing rooms, where we watched question time in the upper and lower house.
